

Wondering if schools are open today? For the most current updates, listen to local radio stations (WAVE 102.3 FM and WOLF 106.9 FM) in the mornings.


We also update our website and communicate via Twitter and Facebook with news about school closures, but please be aware that power outages or technical problems may prevent us from doing so.

VIRTUES

Part of having a educative, restorative and preventative culture in working with students around problem behaviours is ensuring that we are actively teaching what we expect student (and adult) behaviour to look and sound like. This year we have returned to the Virtues Project as part of this active teaching.

Our virtue for September was Kindness, tying into the introduction of the teaching of the Golden Rule. Thankfulness was the focus for October, with Mrs. Patton's class creating a thankfulness tree in the main foyer. In November our students will be learning about peacefulness. We will be building from the messages of our Remembrance Day assembly, to also looking at how we can be peaceful within in ourselves.

Generosity will be the focus for December, with students looking past what is often the tradition of "getting" during this month to more of the idea of giving, be it time, kindness, thoughtfulness or material items.

The work on the virtues not only supports the teaching aspect of our Code of Conduct, it also helps to develop students ability to think and reflect on the Personal and Social Core Competencies.

PERMISSION SLIPS

Students require written permission in order to participate on any activity that occurs off of the school grounds. Years ago we were able to take verbal permission over the phone when students forgot to bring their permission slip in on time. However, this is no longer the case.

Some of our students are not as comfortable around dogs as others. With this in mind, please remember to keep your dog on a short leash while on the playground. As well, please keep all dogs to the outside of the playground areas and away from doors.

PRACTICING LOCK DOWN

The next of our emergency drills needing practice is a full school lock down. This drill will be coordinated with the RCMP, as they need to know our plan in order to support us in the event of a true emergency.

Prior to the lock down drill we are going to practice moving to our safe, off site location, so that all staff and students know where to go and what to do.

In the event of a true lock down, any staff or students who are outside the building will evacuate to this safe location. Lock Downs are called with there is a threat within the building. Having staff or students re-enter a building with a known threat is counterintuitive.

We will send out notification prior to our actual lock down drill. The practice of leaving to our safe place will happen without such prior notice (it will be weather dependent!).



ZAP TIME

At Cinnabar we believe all students can learn. We also believe that ZEROES AREN'T POSSIBLE. Yet, at times, these two beliefs collide. The consequence of not doing the work is DOING THE WORK!

Getting to a point where ZEROES AREN'T POSSIBLE requires some additional support for some students. Beginning Tuesday November 8, and continuing every Tuesday and Thursday as long as there is need, ZAP time will be provided for those students who require extra time to get their work done. ZAP time will occur at long recess, and Mrs. Patton will be there to answer questions and support students in successfully completing their



assignments.

The best case scenario is for students to get their work done in class or as homework. Yet ZAP time will give one more way of meeting students unique needs. We thank you in advance for your support of ZAP!
