Toys at school

We all want students to have a great day at school. Many students choose to bring items from home to play with at our recess breaks. Some also like to have these items at the workspaces in the classes. While there are students who can function quite well with a treasured item within site/touch, many have great difficulty doing so. The toys become a distraction to the students or others in the class. Further, so students most treasured items go missing or get broken, leading to great heartache. We are asking that students keep their toys at home. If they do choose to bring something to school, toys need to be kept safely in backpacks until such time that it is appropriate to use them (recess, sharing in class). Please note that the school is unable to take responsibility for lost or broken items.





Forks and Spoons

Everyday students come down to the office to get a fork or a spoon to be able to eat items in their lunch. Please do your best to ensure that your children have everything they need to eat their lunch with them when the leave for school. We are trying to reduce the amount of waste, for environmental and economic reasons. We actually have to shop

specifically for forks/spoons for students to use. The cost for these items comes out of our operating budget – the more of these we buy, the less we have to spend on other items to support learning.

One further reminder: we are unable to warm up any lunch item brought to school. Please consider getting a thermos (I see many in use already!) if you would like your child to have a hot item in their lunch.
