# Is it bullying or just being mean?

Sometimes it is very hard to tell the difference to what is going on with student conflict. The term bullying gets used a great deal when in fact many issues are other types of misconduct. It is helpful to empower students with the correct words to name the behaviours so that they are able to deal with them! As adults, knowing where to focus the problem solving efforts is also key to support children in times of strife. Here are some quick tips for naming the behaviours:

## Bullying

Serious hurtful behavior

- Power difference due to age, size and social status targeted
- Intend to be mean or harm – not accidental
- Usually repeated over time\* - a pattern
- \*could be a one off event if intended

## Peer Conflict



- Times when you disagree with someone and you can't solve a problem • Usually hang out together
- equally upset Similar size, age and
- social equals
- After calming down both want to solve the problem
- Will be able to work things out with adult help

## Being Mean

#### Being hurtful to someone by name calling, taking something, teasing or leaving them out

- Not planned
  Aimod at any
- Aimed at <u>any</u> nearby child
- Usually feel badly after for the harm caused
- Not a pattern of cruelty

### Is it a *conflict*, being *mean* or being a *bully*?

- 1. Two friends having a dispute over whether a hockey goal was scored or what game to play
- 2. Three girls frequently not letting another girl play with them
- 3. Someone feeling upset or angry and yelling at a nearby classmate in a hurtful way on their way to the playground (one off)

The Board of Education is currently consulting parents, students and the public about its Facilities Plan Update. During the next several weeks, the Board will be holding public forums to discuss the proposals in the plan. The format of these forums has been designed to encourage dialogue and discussion. At each meeting, there will be a short introductory session; a presentation; a facilitator-led discussion group on topics of importance to each community; and a short closing session.

The meetings scheduled for school zones are as follows:

### South Zone - Cedar Area Elementary Schools

### Tuesday, October 6: 7 to 9 p.m. – North Cedar Intermediate

Discussion group topics will include the amalgamation of North Cedar Intermediate and Woodbank Primary schools, with the proposed closure of one of the two schools in June 2016.

### North Zone - Rutherford Elementary

### Thursday, October 8: 7 to 9 p.m. – Rutherford Elementary

Discussion group topics will include the proposed closure of Rutherford Elementary in June 2017, as well as the future plans to relocate the district's Skills for Life Program.

### Tuesday, October 13: 7 to 9 p.m. - Frank J. Ney Elementary

Discussion group topics will include the construction of a new wing at Frank J. Ney Elementary as well as the relocation of students from Rutherford Elementary to Frank J. Ney, McGirr and Randerson Ridge elementary schools.

### **Central Zone - Woodlands Secondary**

### Tuesday, October 20: 7 to 9 p.m. – Woodlands Secondary

Discussion group topics include the proposed closure of Woodlands Secondary in June 2016, with the relocation of students into Wellington Secondary and Nanaimo District Secondary schools.

### **District Programs**

### Tuesday, October 27: 7 to 9 p.m. - Nanaimo District Secondary

Discussion of the possible relocation of Learn@Home programs (K-7 and 8-12) to one location.

Discussion group topics will include the proposed relocation of the following district programs:

French Immersion, VAST, RAVENS, CTC, OWL, ABOUT, Secondary Academies, Secondary Skills for Life

The plan proposes significant changes to schools in our district and it is important for the Board of Education to hear parents' input. We hope that as many parents as possible will attend one of these forums and participate in the discussion groups.
