Welcome Bells


If you have been dropping your child(ren) off this week you may have noticed an additional bell. We have added a "welcome bell" three minutes before the instructional day begins and again three minutes before long recess ends to help remind students to get ready to return to class. The goal is to ensure that the maximum number of instructional minutes are being reached for all students. The new bells ring at 8:42 and 12:17. Student attendance procedures have not changed. If your child arrives after 8:45 or 12:20 he or she will continue to come to the office to get a welcome slip to ensure that we know he or she is with us.



PBIS Update

We are in our third month of handing out Valley Viper tickets and working on explicitly teaching behaviour expectations. The students are responding well to the consistent messages around being safe, responsible and respectful in all areas of the school. Last Friday we had our second teaching assembly focusing on hallway, washroom and recess break expectations. Taught through a Jeopardy style game where the students were team "Onion" and I was team "Potato", the students racked up a huge bank account knowing the answers to almost all of the questions! I was so very impressed!

In looking at the data on problem behaviour (PB) referrals, the issue that we need address most with students is hands on behaviours on the playground. The following graph shows the types of incidents that have been reported to the office. Please note that we now collect information on both minor problems as well as major ones in the goal of doing some re-teaching to address these concerns before they get out of hand.



Reinforcing the need to keep hands and feet to self when playing games is the focus right now for issues on the playground. The majority of the issues involve intermediate students (grades 4-7). When spoken to, the students are able to agree that their behaviour is not safe which is step #1. Step #2 is teaching alternate means to play which is coming.

As for consequences, we really focus on problem solving discussions and community service. Students will be given brooms to use on the primary playground to improve the safety of the grounds by sweeping the pea gravel back towards the

equipment.

One additional step that has been included at Cinnabar is the introduction of the Viper Den as a staffed place for students to visit for the first 20 minutes of long recess. Students who need to finish up work, or who have been asked to complete a think sheet meet there and be supported through the process by Mrs. Holt. They will then go outside for the last 20 minutes of the recess break.

Math P&E

Our school goal at Cinnabar focuses on the development of computational fluency to assist in the key skills of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. To this end the staff has been working on an inquiry plan during our PLC times on Monday. Beginning with a math assessment on addition and related skills for all students, data has now been analyzed and students have been grouped by instructional need—either prevention or enrichment. We are focuses on specifics—for instance, developing 1:1 correspondence for student developing their sense of number to addition with regrouping for numbers greater than 3 digits or addition of integers. All teaching staff, including Mr. Huneault, Mrs. Irving and Ms. Charles will be working with a group of students on their particular area of focus twice a week for 30 minutes for two weeks. We will then re-assess and see if the intervention made a difference in student learning.

The intervention blocks have been scheduled to occur "on top of" regular math instruction. We are making this a priority for our learners – and we are very excited. Once we finish with our addition focus we will repeat the process for subtraction, multiplication and division. Our goal in the end is to have students working at grade level (or above) in their ability to add, subtract, multiply and divide while developing a solid understanding of WHAT they are doing and WHY they do it!



Constable Fraser is now working with the grade 5's on the DARE program which stands for Drugs Alcohol Resistance Education. The 10 session course works on teaching students how to resist and deal with peer pressure around substances including cigarettes. Constable Fraser is well known to our school community as she is our School Liaison Officer. The students are responding well to this pro-

gram. Families will be invited to a graduation celebration must prior to Spring Break.
